Where Two or Three Are Gathered, We Find Christ.

Polarization. Divisiveness. Disrespect. Whatever happened to the days when we could disagree about an issue but still treat each other with civility? It seems as though there is no room for peaceable disagreement. I see this in our nation's legislative bodies. I see it in the community and sometimes I see it in the church. We are less tolerant and more likely to be offended by those who think differently. The result is a society that is more likely to ostracize those with whom we disagree. This constant state of bickering and disagreement contributes to a rising sense of isolation, frustration, and helplessness.

I wonder what would happen if we kept Christ in the center of our relationships? Jesus says "Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matt. 18:20). I think we could start to treat each other with more respect if we see Christ in everyone, even those who have differing viewpoints. Pause and pray before responding sharply to another person. He or she is also a child of God and deserves our respect and love.

Recently, I saw that The Way Forward Commission, which is meeting to determine how the United Methodist Church can function as a denomination in the face of deep division, has been soliciting opinions from a number of groups. Predictably, each faction expressed an extreme position that left no room for differing viewpoints. Now the commission will sort through all these statements and recommend something—possibly a change in structure— that is unlikely to please everyone. I do hope it will allow us to continue as a united denomination. I pray daily for the commission, that God will infuse their discussions and guide their decisions.

Historically, the United Methodist Church has valued differences in theology. The gift of our denomination has been its ability to hold man beliefs in tension and focus instead on those things we can agree upon. It is a good strategy for the local church as well. Both Alton and St. Paul are undergoing changes, yet if each focuses on the common goal of making disciples for Christ, we can thrive regardless of what happens on the denominational level. Before focusing on the negative in another person, see Christ. Before attacking or insulting another person, treat them as you would treat Christ. Jesus also said "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me" (Matt. 10:40). Be the first to welcome another in the name of Christ and that will go a long way to finding common ground.

We are never going to agree to everything. There will always be differences in our understanding of the Bible, in politics, economics, culture- you name it. But when we see Christ in each other, we can possibly take

> the contempt our of our disagreements and replace it with respect. May Christ infuse all your relationships.

UMW will meet Thursday, August 17, 6:00 pm in the church library.


After a light meal, the program will be based on the Call to Prayer and Self-Denial. Business includes financial decisions on support for mission projects and Adopt-a-Program.

Be prepared for a once in a lifetime event!

On August 21st, there will be a total solar eclipse in the United States. This is the first visible eclipse in 38 years and the first eclipse visible in Missouri since the 1800's.

The eclipse begins at around 11:45 am and last until 2:40 pm.

At 1:13-1:15, totality begins and ends— the moment where the sun is completely covered by the moon.

Do not look at the eclipse at any point (except for the 2 minutes of total darkness) without proper safety measures, such as eclipse glasses or a projection.

Oregon County will be able to see around 95% of the totality of the eclipse. Don't miss this once in a life time opportunity!
