Hope is Restored at Easter

My favorite day of the year is Easter, because if it were not for the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we would not have hope. Jesus' exemplary life and teachings would have made him a great prophet, but only He offered himself willingly on the cross in order that we all could have eternal life. So I live this life as fully as I can, knowing there is a better life yet to come. As good as this life can be, I know that one day I will be united with God in eternity. That is the source of my hope.

Sometimes hope can be hard to find. When we face sickness, either our own or that of a loved one, hope can be fragile. When we face to death of a loved one, it can be hard to say good bye, and hope for the future fades. When times are hard economically or we see division and distrust among people in our own country, hope can be tarnished. When we focus too much on our own lives and not enough on Jesus Christ, we forget that Christ is the source of all hope.

In our humanity, we focus on the things around us —what we can see, hear, taste and feel. Jesus experienced these senses as well. He understood how difficult it is for us to imagine a reality that is beyond our ability to taste, touch, see or feel. Trust in me, Jesus says. Trust also in the One who sent me. God has a wonderful future planned for all of us. When we cross the threshold from this life to the next, we will see what for now we can only trust God has promised. Each Easter my hope is rekindled as I celebrate Christ's resurrection. I try to imagine the awe of Mary and companions when they discovered the open tomb, the skepticism of the disciples when they first heard the news, and their absolute joy when Jesus appeared with them in the Upper Room. I am reminded of a God who loves us so much that his Son transcended death for our sake.

I have enjoyed taking a deeper look at the 13th through the 17th chapters of John during the Lenten Bible study. As Jesus gives his final instructions to the disciples at the Last Supper, God's extravagant, expansive love for us becomes clear. As Jesus approached the terrifying end of his earthly life, he was most concerned about his companions, and wanted to prepare them for the trials that were to come. The depth of his love is so clear it leaves me breathless. On Easter Sunday I celebrate new life in Christ and I am reminded that God's love knows no bounds.
