Why Take a Vacation from Church?

When I was a child, attendance at church every Sunday was expected. It was a rare Sunday that the family missed worship. The discipline of weekly attendance has stayed with me as an adult. Aside from the fact that people notice when the pastor takes a Sunday off, I plan my Sunday around worship. I would do that if I were not in ministry. Even when I travel, I find a local church for on Sunday, and I enjoy the similarities and differences between that service and the one I normally attend. Nowadays, it seems that attending church on Sunday is just one option among many. More people are choosing to sleep in, or go out for breakfast, or go to a child's sports activities, or play golf or one of many other activities instead of worship. I wonder why is it so hard to set aside one hour for God?

Church Consultant Thom Rainer offers several reasons why people attend church less often. He suggests the

We are minimizing the importance of the local church.

We worship the idols of activities.

We take a lot of vacations from church.

We do not have high expectations of our members.

We make infrequent attendees leaders in our churches.

It is more acceptable to decide to "take the day off" from church than it has ever been. Ultimately, it is your decision whether to attend on any given Sunday. The only consequence is to your relationship with God. A healthy relationship takes work, and that includes setting aside time to be with God. When we worship as a group, we reinforce and encourage our relationship with God. Thom Rainer has a point when he suggests that we have minimized the importance of the local church. It used to be the center of our social activities. Now it is one choice among many, not only on Sunday but throughout the week. And I agree that we have elevated the importance of other activities above our worship of God. God has clearly said that we should not put anything above God. I am flexible about a lot of things, but the 10 Commandments continue to direct my life and my relationship with God.

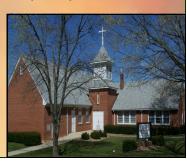
Rainer points out that, for 2000 years, the church has been that place where believers gather to worship, minister and be accountable to one another. It is not the building that makes a church, but the people who support each other, praise God, and hold each other accountable. Once we being to step away from the discipline of weekly attendance, it becomes easier to miss the next week, and the next, until we have drifted away. I also agree with Rainer that our congregational leaders set the example for all to follow. If our leaders are not attending regularly, then who else will feel obligated to be there?

I am not pointing fingers. But over the years, in every church I have been part of, it has increasingly been acceptable to find other things to do on Sunday morning. One thing has not changed: God desperately wants to be in a relationship with you. God continually invites you into that relationship. Worship is one way that you can carve



time out of your week to be with God. My prayer is that your desire to be with God continues to grow and that it includes a desire to worship one hour a week with your friends at church.
