Lent Begins Preparation for Easter

March 1 is the beginning of Lent, the period of preparation for Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent is 40 days in length, recalling the days Jesus spent in the wilderness in preparation for his public ministry, fasting and being tempted by Satan. Sundays are not counted as part of the season because each Sunday is considered a "mini-Easter," when the somber spirit of Lent is replaced with anticipation of the Christ's resurrection.

The secular world doesn't care about Lent, but as Christians, this is a time for reflection fasting, and preparation for Easter. The word "Lent" comes from the Anglo Saxon word 'lencten', which means "spring." In the church where I grew up, there was a great emphasis on "giving something up" for Lent. We spent time on the playground comparing who had made the greatest sacrifice as judged by what we fasted from during the season. The appearance of piety was important to these young grade-schoolers. As I recall, candy or soda were the things we most often abstained from.

In the early church, Lent was a time for new converts to prepare for baptism. Today, it is a time of selfexamination and reflection. My focus is less on sacrifice and more on personal discipline. I think giving something up is similar to making a New Year's resolution. Within a few days, the resolution is broken and we go on with our lives as though nothing has changed. When my focus is on discipline and sacrifice, I know I will occasionally falter in my daily discipline, but I gently call myself back to focus. This year, I have resolved to spend more time journaling. Writing in response to scripture and prayers deepens my relationship with God, yet, I have found myself too busy to make time for this discipline. By publicly stating my intent to write more, I am also making myself more accountable. My purpose is to deepen my understanding of and relationship with God.

The Lenten journey begins with Ash Wednesday services on April 1. The Alton service is at 5:15 p.m. and the St. Paul service is at 7 p.m. This service allows participants to focus on our mortality, repent our sins and return to loving God. Ashes are placed on the forehand as a visible sign of repentance.

At both St. Paul and Alton there will be an opportunity for a short-term Bible study during Lent. We will be using the book, "With Jesus in the Upper Room," by Maxie Dunnam. This is a study of the 13th through the 17th chapters of John, a section known as Jesus' farewell address to the disciples. By taking a closer look at these chapters, participants will come to a deeper understanding of God's love. Please join me at 6 p.m. Tuesdays, beginning March 7 at St. Paul and 6:15 p.m. Wednesdays at Alton. In addition, both

churches are planning special daily services during Holy

Week, April 10-14. St. Paul will meet in the morning at 7 a.m. Alton will meet at 6 p.m. Please make plans to be part of these special services.





Small Church Initiative Moves Ahead

After many months of planning, preparation, the Small Church Initiative is about to launch at St. Paul United Methodist Church. A consultant team of Rev. Jon Spaulding and Rev. Suzanne Nicholson will be at St. Paul March 17 and 18. On Friday, March 17, they will interview church leaders in the afternoon and then meet with the entire congregation in the evening. There will be a chili supper at 6 p.m. that evening, followed by a Town Hall meeting at 7 p.m. On Saturday, the leadership team will meet with the consultants to learn areas of strength and areas of concern. The consultants will then present three prescriptions or action items they believe the congregation must focus on in the future.

Through the Small Church Initiative (SCI), consultants are delivered to the club. We don't have to invited to study the history and current conditions in the church and them make recommendations to revitalize that church. St. Paul is typical of many United Methodist churches struggling with declines in attendance and membership. The consultants will bring fresh ideas that may help the congregation grow into the future. After the consultants depart, the congregation will meet twice more over the next six weeks to discuss the prescriptions. Immediately after worship on April 30, there will be a church conference in which all members of the congregation can vote on whether to adopt or reject the prescriptions.

The SCI is designed to help the church change its focus from maintenance to mission. This is our opportunity to strengthen this congregation and ensure that it is a vital presence in Thayer into the future. All members are encouraged to participate in the Town Hall meeting on March 17 and the follow-up meetings April 2 and April 23. If you have any questions, please speak with Pastor Pam.
